### President's Corner by Mary Williams:

Greetings Birders! Have you thought about accessibility lately? Snow and ice and mud-covered trails can make even the most athletic birders pause. I am delighted with the recent emphasis National Audubon has placed on birding for those with handicapping conditions. I'm also delighted with the number of good birding spots in our area that meet most of the 'birdability' criteria.

If you or someone you know needs an easy walk, needs handicapped parking adjacent to bird walks, or a place to use a walker or wheelchair – or push a baby stroller, or avoid mud! – check out these birding hotspots:



Woodland Lake Park in Pinetop has a mostly-level, wide paved trail of about a mile around the lake that is very close to parking. Benches and restrooms available.



The closed campground at Rainbow Reservoir off Hwy 260 in Lakeside is along the level, paved and little-used Rainbow Lake Lane which ends at the dam. Birders can walk across the dam to or from the paved parking area at the boat launch off Lakeside Lane.



Fool Hollow State Park in Show Low has numerous paved day use parking areas on both sides of the lake, where there is access to both paved paths and roadways and more challenging trails and steps – as well as to numerous picnic tables and restrooms. (Entry fee.)



Pintail Lake off Hwy 77 north of Hwy 60 in Show Low has a level concrete walk of about .5 miles from a concrete handicapped parking pad. It leads to a viewing platform and to a covered shelter with benches.

#### Bird Counts

It's most likely impossible for any of our White Mountain birders to accurately log a Red-bellied Woodpecker as pictured in the national promotion for the annual Great Backyard Bird Count from February 12 to 15. But there are at least four other possible and frequent woodpecker sightings here, and all were spotted during the WMAS recent annual Timber Mesa Christmas Bird Count. (Acorn, Lewis's, Hairy and Downy).

Although the weather on the first Saturday in January was prohibitive or limiting for our volunteers, 1,875 birds of 56 species were reported on our official count day to the National Audubon Society for their 122nd CBC massive citizen science project. (We added 11 more species during count week.) 78 species were logged in last year's count when our overall numbers were higher on a beautiful calm sunny winter day! A Bonaparte's Gull sighted by the Wilsons at Little Mormon Lake was a rarity this year.

Thanks to count week volunteers Sue Sitko, Ann Hilliard, Ken McByrd-Bell, Carla Whalen, Susie Walker and especially to Rob Bettaso, Jon Orona and John and Betsy Wilson who braved snow and ice-covered roads and trails on a cold and cloudy New Year's Day. Do submit your yard and neighborhood ebird lists on Valentine's Day weekend for another effort by Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the Audubon Society to document our bird populations.



## OTHER RECENT EVENTS:

As some Newsletter readers may recall, I have been on the look out for someone to assist (or preferably, replace) me as the Field Trips Coordinator. Additionally, because our Board is currently well represented in the older demographics, I have been hoping to find someone who not only is a proficient birder, but who is also of a younger generation. While I haven't yet found a person who has sufficient free time to lead ALL of our monthly birding trips, I have recruited an exceptional birder who thinks he will have time enough to at least assist me on a regular basis. As such, on our January field trip, we were joined by Jon Orona, a highly skilled birder who has a gift for not only bird identification but is also an excellent communicator/educator. So, I've asked Jon if he would be willing to write-up a summary of our most recent field trip and I think you will find it fascinating reading.
