### Out on a Limb by Tom Jernigan (Vice President & Treasurer, WMAS):

I don't usually sit around and think dire thoughts about climate change, but a bird that has recently been hanging out at our bird feeder got me going. We have never seen this bird before in our twenty plus years at this location. The only other time we have seen it is south of Tucson about ten years ago: a Bridled Titmouse.

I know it is difficult to notice specific examples of climate change; it being such a long-term phenomenon. But, the presence or absence of birds can be change that you can put your finger on. National Audubon reports that, in recent times, a majority of bird species in North America have shifted their winter range north by more than thirty-five miles. Scientists estimate that the Pygmy Nuthatch may lose enough pine habitat in coming years to drive it close to extinction.

Yes, I know that other species may move north to replace the ones lost. But, a couple of things make me sad:

1. I LIKE the Pygmy Nuthatch outside my window.
2. Many species will move north or up in elevation trying to adapt. But that can only go so far—then what?

If you're coming from the north, it's ~1 mile beyond the light on Hwy 260 at W Old Linden Road.

## MOST RECENT FIELD TRIP:

On Feb 19<sup>th</sup> we visited Jacquez Marsh, Scott Reservoir, & Porter Creek. Ken & Karen proved once again that they are quite cold-tolerant, as they have made each of our last 4 field trips (Nov-Feb). We tallied 27 species, mostly waterfowl, including several eye-catching drake Cinnamon Teal & the ever elegant Pintail drakes. Bald Eagles were common, as they so often are this time of year. We enjoyed observing a boisterous Marsh Wren and had a quick glimpse of a Sage Thrasher. Ken and I took turns offering Karen (a beginning birder) our thoughts on the best field marks to use when identifying the species that were new to her.

In Tom's "Out on a Limb" (up above), we read how he & Liz had a 1<sup>st</sup> time visit to their feeder by a Bridled Titmouse (a species they had previously seen only south of Tucson). Whether we are watching the birds at our feeders or are out in the field observing species in their wild habitats, we learn that the visual field marks are only one challenging and enjoyable aspects of birding. We also soon realize that traits such as seasonality, behavior, ecology, & conservation status are every bit as important to learn as a bird's appearance and vocalizations.

It's a big world and thankfully it's filled with an amazing array of living creatures. Whether you want to get to know them intimately or just enjoy seeing them for a brief moment in time, come join us and we can all learn together. --Rob
